1 **MOMENT OF INERTIA**

Dan Inglis and Jeremy Mayall

'Moment of Inertia' examines ideas of time and motion; eternity and cycles; travel; and predetermination.

2 **MATARIKI (SATURDAY NIGHT ONLY)**

Dr Mesmers Private Army featuring Horomona Horo

Dr. Mesmers Private Army present an array of sonic textures, which are paired with real-time visual elements, to explore the themes and ideas of Matariki through an experience unlike anything else.

3 **OUT OF YOUR DEPTH**

Paul Nelson

'Out of your depth' is an interactive projection work that combines a soundtrack and depth information from a sensor to manipulate the projected image. When a person enters the active area they become part of the work, and can alter the state of the projection with their bodies or objects.

4 **CONTAINED LUMINESCENCE**

Paul Bradley, Regan Balzar, Horomona Horo, Jeremy Mayall and Lauren Kerr-Bell

A multi-sensory, multimedia installation created collaboratively by a group of Hamilton artists. This installation will take audiences on a journey exploring what Matariki means to us.

6 **TE TIAHO O MATARIKI**

Neil Miller

'Te Tiaho O Matariki' is a sculptural manifestation of the Pleiades in the form of a growing vine. The strong, winding tendril is also a visual reminder of the importance of the nearby Waikato River. The stars of the Matariki appear as the fruit on this extraordinary plant. The sculpture is a sign of growth, unity and continuity.

7 **TE WHĀRIKI KIOKIO**

Mahi Tahī Studio (Stacey Tangaere & Luke McConnell)

An interactive digital installation inspired by whareniui tukutuku panel designs from the East Coast. Stepping on the foot plates causes the intricate tukutuku panel designs to emerge, while activating sounds of taonga pūoro. The animations attempt to visualise the meaning behind each tukutuku.

8 **LASER HARP**

AkashaMan (Simon Hamid)

This installation is intended to provide the 'player' with a safe, interactive experience using a visually emotive and expressive electronic device to create music. It is the only instrument of its kind in this part of the world so be sure to visit and try it!

9 **TREE OF LIGHT**

Michael Lamusse (ACLX) and Jeremy Mayall

A site specific light and sound installation that moves through an abstract realisation of different life cycles.

10 **POINT OF VIEW**

Luke McConnell

This installation is an exploration of light and space, investigating how these elements can inform or deceive visual perception.

11 **SEMPITERNAL**

The piece explores a concept of everlasting time with long-form repetition and ever evolving time displacement.

12 **KARU**

Karu is an interactive projection designed to invite children to interact with building projection through their creativity.
