Kai Tiaki Nursing Research Journal

Overview

Has been published annually since 2010

Kai Tiaki Nursing Research is an internationally double blinded peer reviewed research journal. It publishes original, full length manuscripts from New Zealand based researchers

(or other researchers where their research has particular relevance to nursing in New Zealand)

Why publish in Kai Tiaki Nursing Research?

- Importance of 'knowledge transfer' into the New Zealand context for nursing
 - Research by New Zealand nurses
 - For New Zealand nurses
- While PBRF rankings are important for established researchers working in educational institutions, publishing locally is also important in creating repositories of distinctly New Zealand knowledge for nursing.
- Kai Tiaki Nursing Research is available full text, in the following databases:
 - Nursing & Allied Health Collection (Gale) Nursing Resource Center and Academic OneFile (Gale)
 - EbscoHost and other subscribed library data bases
- Kai Tiaki Nursing Research articles are also cited internationally.

KTNZ invites submissions from:

New and emerging researchers

Nurses who are undertaking master's degrees who wish to publish their research on clinical or professional topics, which have relevance for other nurses in New Zealand.

Established researchers

Established researchers who wish to share their findings or experiences of conducting research in the New Zealand context.

Clinicians who have undertaken research-based projects

Clinicians who want to publish research or audits undertaken in their work role

1. Examples of potential submissions

Research manuscripts

Original research papers should be 3000-5000 words in length for the main text, excluding abstract, tables and references. The findings of the research should be relevant to nursing, however there are multiple possibilities for topics, such as research conducted by researchers from other disciplines that has relevance to health and nursing.

Research briefs

Research briefs are limited reports (1200-1500 words) featuring research with important implications for practice. Research briefs (in extended abstract form) could be focused on research in progress, or a precis of a research report.

Commentary

Kai Tiaki Nursing Research invites commentary on papers published in previous editions. Commentaries should be 1000-1500 words and provide a frank, honest review of the research article. Original authors will have the opportunity to respond to commentaries prior to publication.

2. Examples of potential submissions

Research methodology articles

Research methodology articles are reports (2000-3000 words) featuring a methodology with important implications for research in practice. Submissions should include the focus and context for the researcher's experience in using the approach including, core elements of the methodology, specific ethical considerations and procedures for data collection and analysis. The implications for other researchers using this methodological approach should also be considered.

Literature review

Review articles (2000-3000 words) could publish the literature review section of a dissertation, or the background to development of a programme.

Meta-analyses

Meta-analyses or systematics reviews (quantitative, qualitative or mixed methods) are also welcomed as submissions that contribute to the evidence base for nursing. Meta-analyses should follow a similar format to research manuscripts reporting on primary studies.

3. *Examples of potential submissions*

Clinical audits

Clinical or compliance audits that have significant recommendations for nursing practice.

Clinical guidelines

Clinical guidelines or policies that have been developed using evidence-based procedures.

Submission procedures

Referencing

Kai Tiaki Nursing Research uses 7th edition APA style referencing. The editorial team can help you with changes you might need to make to referencing.

Relevance of submissions

Submissions

Manuscripts should be submitted initially as a Word file to kaitiakiresearch@nzno.org.nz; numbered figures and tables should be included in the Word file in the first instance. To facilitate the reviewing process, the manuscript should be formatted with the body text in 12 point Times New Roman with line spacing of 1.5. Text should be left-aligned and surrounded by 3cm margins. High-quality figure files will be requested if necessary.

Editorial processes

Double blind review

- Experienced researchers with experience using the methodology in the field of the research.
- Nurse Practitioners or clinical specialists who are able to review clinical focus and

Editorial feedback from review

- Authors receive a letter with clear directions about what revisions are required for publication based on the reviews.
- Following submission of a manuscript, all correspondence, up to the stage of acceptance, is attended by the editor-in-chief (Patricia.McClunie-Trust@wintec.ac.nz) and will be by email. After acceptance, all matters related to printing will be dealt with by the production editor (kasstonz@yahoo.co.nz).
