




At Rainbow Place

Why have a Review?



- · To assess the development of Rainbow Place to date
- · To assess how well it was working
- To suggest how it could best evolve in the future to meet the needs of the Waikato community

The review was undertaken between March and August 2011 by Professor Philip Darbyshire, in collaboration with colleagues from WINTEC, and with the support of the Waikato District Health Board.





The Review Process



Professor Philip Darbyshire Review of the Rainbow Place service

- ☐ Revisited Rainbow Place to plan the review
- ☐ Online Survey families, children, young people, staff, volunteers, key-stakeholders
- ☐ Face-to-face interviews (with above groups)
- □ Draft report produced with recommendations for future development
- □ Professor Darbyshire returned in November 2011 with the full report and recommendations for future growth and development of the service

The Darbyshire Report

Key Findings

Parents and families/whanau

- · Rainbow Place is caring, welcoming, flexible, safe, responsive and non-judgemental
- valued the specific children's nursing, health and counselling skills and expertise that were available
 - "... it's not just their job, they actually do really care."

Children and young people


- Rainbow Place was better than they thought it would be 'fun'!
- appreciated the various activities offered, eg. art work, teen group, and social activities
 - "At Rainbow Place you're having counselling but you don't know you are having counselling"


Key Stakeholders

working with Rainbow Place was almost entirely 'positive'
 "I have always had a very positive reception and response whenever I have approached the service".

Key Recommendations

- Expand criteria to include 'sudden death' of a loved one
- Enhance Rainbow Place environment for all ages
- Increase use of 'sleepover' (respite) facility
- · Market and promote the "best kept secret in the Waikato"

"There can be no place in children's palliative care for a Procrustean 'one size fits all' approach that would either proscribe or prescribe 'beds'."


