Sally Peters and Simon Archard (University of Waikato) will e-present on The rich world of children's working theories

Working theories, and disposition are key learning outcomes of New Zealand's early childhood curriculum *Te Whāriki* (Ministry of Education, 2017). In *Te Whāriki* working theories are described as "the evolving ideas and understandings that children develop as they use their existing knowledge to try to make sense of new experiences" (Ministry of Education, p.23). A number of projects have explored what this means in practice and the pedagogical approaches that help to explore, support and stretch children's thinking. This presentation revisits the working theory lens to consider the surprising depth of young children's ideas and ways to recognise and enhance creative and critical thinking.

Helen Hedges (University of Auckland) will e-present on From funds of knowledge to funds of identity: Shifts in emphases and methods

Funds of identity developed from the notion of funds of knowledge to consider all life experiences that collectively shape identity development. It draws attention to the relationships, settings, experiences, and cultural tools and symbols that are of interest and personally meaningful to people. Whether or not learners" funds of identity are recognized and responded to in education settings still depends largely on teachers' efforts to become familiar with children and their families. Approaches to research grounded in funds of knowledge draw on ethnographic methods. Teachers visit families to learn about and gain an appreciation of family experiences and funds of knowledge. Research approaches centred on funds of identity have also used methods from arts-based approaches and visual ethnography, and more recently narratives.
